International Angle In Case Involving Local Superior Court.

ENVOY WIRES JUDGE

Asks Decision Be Delayed Pending Investigation By State Department.

Notice was received by Judge A. C. Finney of superior court, department two, this morning by telegraph from Manuel C. Tellez, Mexican ambassador at Washington, D. C., to the effect that he has taken the case of Octaviano Morsan up with the state department. Moran was arrested in Calexico recently on a charge of having had immoral relations with a girl, aged 17, but it is charged that he was kidnaped in Mexicali and forced to go acrost the horder in order that his arrest might be effected. He has been held for superior court on the charge. Antonio Escalante, brother of the girl, has been arrested in Mexico en Notice was received by Judge A. has been arrested in Mexico on a charge of kidnaping.

The telegram received by Judge Finney this morning reads as fellows:

"This embassy presented today to the Department of State representations concerning Octaviano Moran, kidnaped and brought illegally before American authorities and has asked co-operation of the department in obtaining his release and restoration. and restoration.

"Attention was invited to the fact that the extradition treaty inforce not only includes specification of the erime of which Moran is accused but provides special procedure in case of crimes commatted infrontier states. It was also pointed not that due to the serionness of the case, if not properly decided could establish projudicial procedure against chlorement laws not treat less between Mexico and the Unifersitate.

"Promise was mide that in this as in all other cases Mexican government will give due attention to extradition of Moran when demanded through proper channels. While federal authorities take up the matter, I wish to request, honorable judge, your cooperation in deciding this case according to its merits."

Judge Sends Reply

Judge Finney sent a reply to the Mexican ambassador assuring him that the case would be given every consideration. He informed the ambassador that the case would be held in abeyance during the time of investigation by federal authorities. He later received a reply from the ambassador thanking him for his cooperation in the matter.

While the case is scheduled to come before Judge Finney tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock for a hearing on a writ habeas corpus, the hearing will probably be continued in the continued

relative to the case.

If Secretary of State Kellogy holds that there might be a question as to the legality of Moran's presence in the United States at the time of his arrest, the court will continue with the hearing but so the case is one of international concern, protest must be made through government channels and can not be brought into court through protest of an individual.
