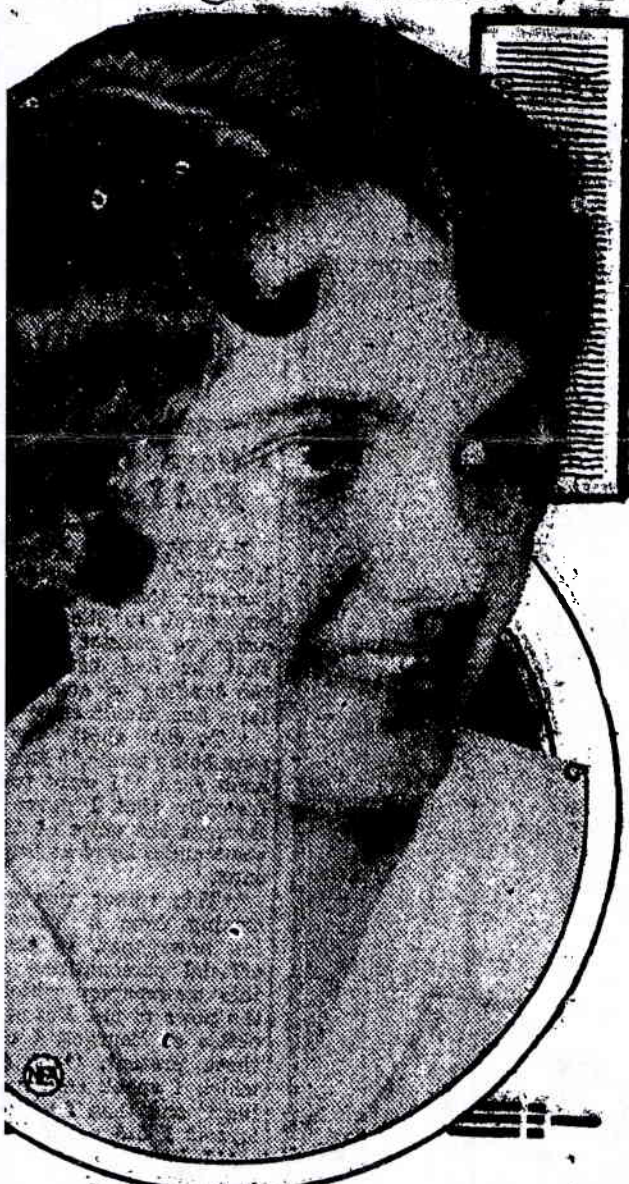

MORAN HEARING SET BY COURT FOR JULY 14

Judge A. C. Finney granted an application for a writ of habeas corpus hearing in the case of Octaviano Moran in superior court, department two, yesterday afternoon. The date of the hearing was set down for Thursday, July 14, at 10 A. M.

According to the affidavit filed in the case the defendant is charged with having immoral relations with a girl, aged 17. It holds that an effort was made by attorney's for the defendant to have Moran surrender himself to the authorities at Calexico to answer to the charge, provided he would be released under \$500 bond at once.

It is pointed out that this agreement was not satisfactory to the Calexico authorities and that they insisted on bail being fixed at \$1,000. The attorney's for the defendant are said to have informed the court that this amount could not be obtained and intimated that Moran would not surrender himself.

According to the affidavit Moran was kidnapped in Mexicali soon after this information was given the court, forced to cross the border at the point of a gun and arrested by Calexico police.

The affidavit holds that as a result of this treatment the prisoner is illegally being held. While he is out under bond, it is pointed out, that he is not allowed to go back into Mexico and as a result is deprived of the freedom necessary to carry on the business in which he is engaged.

Antonio Escalante, charged with the kidnapping, is at present under arrest in Mexicali.

The hearing on the writ of habeas corpus promises to create considerable interest. Whether or not it will be necessary for the defendant to prove a connection between the police of Calexico and the actual kidnapping is one of the questions in the case arousing interest.

The case has already been called to attention at Washington D. C.
